

Veterans Aid & Attendance Benefit 2023 Maximum Pension Rates

Single Veteran	\$2,229 per month	\$26,752 per year
Married Veteran	\$2,642 per month	\$31,714 per year
Widowed Spouse of a Veteran	\$1,432 per month	\$17,192 per year
Spouse of a Living Healthy Veteran	\$1,750 per month	\$21,001 per year
Veteran Married to Veteran	\$3,536 per month	\$42,433 per year

Amounts are maximum possible benefit payments. Not every veteran/claimant will qualify to receive the maximum amount.

To qualify for the Aid & Attendance benefit, veterans must meet the following conditions:

1. Veteran must have served at least 90 days of active military service with at least one day being during a wartime period.

Official periods of war include:

The Mexican Border, 05/09/1916-04/05/1917

World War I, 04/06/1917-11/11/1918 (04/01/1920 if served in Russia)

World War II, 12/07/1941-12/31/1946

Korean Conflict, 06/27/1950-01/31/1955

Vietnam War, 08/05/1964-05/07/1975 (11/01/1955 if served in Vietnam)

Persian Gulf War, 08/02/1990-TBD

2. Veteran must have received a military discharge other than dishonorable.

Military discharges include, from highest to lowest: honorable, general, other than honorable, bad conduct, and dishonorable.

3. Veteran or claimant must be in need of the daily aid and attendance of another person in order to avoid the everyday hazards of his or her environment.

Includes help with prescription management, bathing, toileting, dressing, getting in and out of bed and other activities of daily living.

4. Veteran or claimant must be financially eligible.
